We can display the glory of God *both* as we love both at the level of the individual and as we work for a better society.

- Addressing individual challenges
- Addressing structural challenges.

The tragedy of the commons / free-ridership problem.

III. BUILDING FRIENDSHIPS WITH NEIGHBORS

Seven ideas for building friendships with the ultimate hope of seeing them respond to the gospel.

1. Introduce Jesus early on.
2. Know their stories.
3. Live at peace.
4. Do good things.
5. Give them time.
6. Invest in margin.
7. Receive their love.

IV. BUILDING NEIGHBORHOODS

The value of addressing structural problems at the level of a *neighborhood*.

Who: Christians. Why Christians are well-suited to investing in the neighborhood.

How: Four pieces of advice:

1. Submit to authority (1 Peter 2:13).
2. Love your neighbor.
3. Be humble.
 - Very often there is no “Christian” answer to these challenges.
 - Do not let your eagerness to do good lead to division in the body of Christ.
4. Put your hope in heaven.
